SPED Guidelines - What are the Audiological Indicators for a Student to be Classified as Hearing Impaired?

Check out the Arkansas SPED audiological indicators included in the definition of hearing impairment for children ages 3-21 below. The full document can be found at https://tinyurl.com/AR-SPED- Guidelines-K-12.

- An average puretone hearing loss in the speech range (500Hz-2000Hz) of 20dB or greater in the better ear. A child with fluctuating hearing impairment, such as one resulting from chronic otitis media, is classified as hearing impairment (HI).
- An average high frequency, puretone hearing loss of 35dB or greater in the better ear at two or more of the following frequencies 2000, 3000, 4000 and 6000Hz.
- A permanent unilateral hearing loss of 35dB or greater in the speech range (puretone average of 500-2000Hz).
- A diagnosis of auditory neuropathy.

*Tip: In order to get the puretone average for each ear based on the audiogram, you must average responses together of the thresholds for each ear (O=Right; X=Left) at the required frequencies.

Do you need help figuring this out for a specific student? The EARS team is available by email to help you calculate this so that you will feel confident as to whether or not a student is eligible (audiologically) for this category. Email us at ears@archildrens.org for individual assistance.
